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## HOLIDAY TOY DRIVE

### *First Annual Event For Regent Square Holiday Season*

The RSCA is planning its first annual Holiday Toy Drive in our local community, which will run between Thanksgiving and Christmas this year. Regent Square residents are asked to donate new, unwrapped toys to be distributed to a local community agency to help children in need right in our area. A collection box will be located at the Wilkins School and Community Center, located at the corner of Charleston and S. Braddock between Monday, 25-Nov-2002 and Tuesday, 17-Dec-2002. While the RSCA coordinates the toy drive, the ultimate success will depend on the support of the local community and the generosity of people who donate the toys.

Some suggestions for children in different age groups are:

**Infants/toddlers** - Rattles and squeeze toys, musical toys or mobiles, unbreakable baby mirrors, crib toys, picture books, stacking and sorting toys, dolls, large cars and trucks, teething toys, sippy cups.

**Pre-schoolers** - Building toys (large Legos®, blocks), cars and trucks dolls and doll clothes, puzzles, puppets, books, crayons, markers, coloring books, bubbles, Play-Doh®, music-making toys, story and song tapes, stickers, Viewmasters®, Etch-a-Sketch®, pegs and pegboards, new stuffed animals, Regent Square Civic Association Newsletter

simple board games (Candyland®, Chutes and Ladders®, Memory®).

**School age children** - Craft sets, stickers, Nerf toys, playing cards, hand-held games, dolls and doll clothes (Barbie®), matchbox cars, books and comic books, jigsaw puzzles, clothing, collectibles (rock collections, magnets, sports collectibles), games (Trouble®, Monopoly®, Connect Four®, Sorry®), activity books (connect dots, crosswords, word search), building kits (Legos®, Tinker Toys®, Erector Set®).

**Teenagers** - Wallets, calendars and posters, mirrors, grooming kits, address books and journals, walkmans, hair accessories, athletic equipment, music (contemporary CDs and cassettes), board games (Backgammon, trivia games, Uno®), craft kits (cross-stitch, wood-working, paint by numbers).

**What to avoid** - Used toys and used stuffed animals, toys stuffed with shredded foam, small pellets or beans, toys with detachable parts (like button eyes) that could be removed and swallowed or inhaled, electrical, spark-producing or friction-producing toys, fragile toys that can break into small pieces with sharp edges, toys made of glass or brittle plastic, toys with sharp edges or protrusions, toys or craft kits with toxic paints or glues, toys with parts that can pinch fingers or pull hair, toy guns and other violent toys.

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## BRADDOCK AVENUE STUDY

### *Consultants To Hold Community Meeting Nov. 7<sup>th</sup>*

On Thursday 7-Nov-2002 at 7:00 PM, Vollmer Associates will present their preliminary recommendations for the South Braddock Corridor Study at a public meeting. The meeting will be held at the Center for Creative Play, located on Braddock Avenue near the westbound entrance ramp to the Parkway (I-376), known to most residents as the former "Foodland building". Vollmer Associates was hired by the RSCA with a County grant, and has been working with a Steering Committee made up of residents and business owners. The purpose of the Study is to develop recommendations to address a variety of issues concerning the business district along South Braddock.

The consultants have completed analysis of key issues identified by the committee. These issues centered on parking need, traffic speed and congestion, pedestrian connections and safety, land use and zoning conflicts between municipalities, streetscape, landscape and signage.

Analysis completed by Vollmer included weeklong traffic counts with related speeds, parking counts and availability, and a detailed analysis of zoning within the four municipalities. Vollmer has uncovered some interesting results during this analysis, including traffic speeds of up to 50mph along Braddock Avenue during the daytime, cars parked in the business district for all day, and heavy traffic counts along Milton resulting from drivers avoiding Braddock.

However this Study is looking not only at the current picture of what exists along Braddock Avenue, but is considering both the future opportunities and potential problems. Included in future analysis are the impact of the bike path proposed for the lower connection to Frick Park near the Parkway (I-376), the parking need should the business mix change along Braddock, the potential types of development allowed under current zoning, and even the future of the existing landscaping along South Braddock Avenue.

The most critical issue of the Study will be the recommendations of how to resolve the traffic conundrum facing Regent Square. This dilemma, at its worst during the summer, is the vehicular traffic crawling through the block-and-a-half business district and then either speeding through the residential district or past the entrance of the Center for Creative Play and the on/off-ramp from the Parkway.

All Regent Square business owners and residents are invited to this first of two public meetings. This first meeting will review the analysis and give some preliminary recommendations on how to resolve the issues. The second meeting, scheduled for the evening of Monday 2-Dec-2002, will give a draft of the final recommendations, resulting from the community input during this first meeting.

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## TRASH TALES

### *Dealing With Someone Else's Trash Problems*

Maybe you've never had a problem with your trash, or maybe you did and you now have it under control with the suggestions in last month's newsletter. Instead, a neighbor's trash is causing the unsightly and dangerous mess. There may be trash spreading down the alley to your house; that dogs, raccoons, rats and crows are getting into; and that children can get hurt in. What are you to do?

There's a lot that you can do and it's not at all difficult:

If you know the owner, speak to them about the problem. Most likely they are not even aware of it. Provide them with a copy of last month's newsletter article offering suggestions. Explain how you deal with your trash problems and like to keep the neighborhood safe and neat for everyone.

If you don't know the owner, write them a courteous letter. If you're not sure of their name because it is a rental property, you may search page of the Allegheny County Real Estate Web Site listed at [www.county.allegheny.pa.us](http://www.county.allegheny.pa.us) or by calling the Recorder of Deeds Office 412-350-4226.

If it's a landlord, chances are they may not be aware of the problem and will be happy to take actions to maintain high rental values. Describe the problem, why it's detrimental to the neighbors and the neighborhood, and some possible solutions. If the tax bill mailing address is that of a mortgage company or bank, enclose a note asking to have the letter forwarded to the property owner.

If no improvements are made:

Document the problem. Take photos at periodic intervals and write dates and times on them.

Send a letter to the appropriate municipality's code enforcement office and/or to the Allegheny County Health Department. Enclose copies of your earlier letter to the owner and the photos. Include the owner in your letter's c.c. and send them a copy. (See the Regent Square WEB for contact information or consult the phone book "blue pages".)

Follow up with a phone call to the municipality if no change is evident within a month. Remind the authorities of your letter and ask what the next steps should be in solving the problem.

With all of us working together with our neighbors and government agencies, we can continue to live in a clean and safe Regent Square.

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## CAREER COACHING

### *New Practice Opens in Regent Square*

Tory Butterworth, Ph.D. helps people with career issues. "I call it, 'Bringing more of who you are into what you do.' So many people are unhappy with their work. We're in a transition time: earning a steady paycheck is no longer enough, but people are confused about how to find a job that fits with all of who they are."

Tory's approach is based on the ground-breaking book, *What Color is Your Parachute?* This method reverses traditional job-hunting: instead of focusing on the jobs that are already out there, it encourages career changers to figure out what they'd love to do and learn how to find or even create jobs that fit them. "I've used this method for myself in finding jobs, and I actually got to the point that I enjoyed job interviews. I don't know too many other people who can honestly say that!"

Career Coaching includes the standard tools of career counseling: interest inventories, job search strategies, résumés

and job interviews. "But my services don't stop there. I also work with people who are not sure whether they want to leave their current job. Perhaps if they learn some new skills, like boss management or self-promotion, they won't need to leave. Or sometimes there is an issue in another area of their life that masks as a job problem. One woman came to see me wanting to change jobs, but quickly realized she needed to grieve her mother's death, first. I work with people on whatever issue is keeping them stuck."

Tory offers free initial sessions. During that time, potential clients talk to her about what is going on in their lives and why they're unhappy with their career. "I tell them as specifically as possible what we will be doing together and how it can help them. Then they decide how we should proceed."

Just a year ago Tory purchased a house on Savannah Avenue in Regent Square, and two months later rented office space on the corner of Braddock and Hutchinson. "I put up my sign Labor Day weekend, after being virtually 'incognito' for several months. I'm so excited. People are beginning to notice I'm here!"
