YOUR LOCAL RESOURCE!

Wilkins School Community Center In Regent Square

There's always something going on at the Wilkins School Community Center. There are six-week classes, ranging from fitness (at every intensity from T'ai Chi to Step Aerobics), to arts and crafts, and of course dance (in addition to ballet, jazz, and tap, they also offer Swing, Salsa, and Tango). For the less committed, there are mini-classes – an evening to try something new, like Indian cooking, herb-gardening, or making your own soap and lip balm. With offerings like these, the Wilkins School Community Center is one of Regent Square's strongest neighborhood assets.

The Center has expanded its community to the entire city and beyond by being responsive to demand. In some cases, classes have started because there was a strong interest, such as Yoga. Program Director Kay Wetzel pursued leads for a Yoga instructor until she found Debbie Buff, who teaches two Yoga classes at the Center. At the same time, the Center has also become an outlet for local groups looking for space. For example, the building's wooden floors are great for dance groups, which brings in a wide variety of dance classes. The most popular mini-classes right now are the wine tastings, where participants can learn about and sample wines from a particular region or vintner.

A strong drive to improve the community got the Center started back in 1979. Six neighborhood residents approached the Borough of Swissvale about using the vacant Wilkins School building for community classes. The Wilkins School Community Center, or WSCC, was formed as a not-for-profit 501(c)(3) corporation to manage the endeavor. The Borough of Swissvale leases the building to WSCC, who manages it through an all-volunteer board of directors.

Kay Wetzel was one of the original founders. "My kids went to elementary school there, so I guess I have a kind of sentimental attachment to the building," she says. She recalls how the first program of classes was started: "I think we each put in \$10 to get the flyers printed, and then took them around the neighborhood." While a few core volunteers, like Kay, donate many hours to keep the Center running, such commitment is not necessary to get involved. An hour of time on the weekend is always welcome. The Center has not only survived, but thrived, for nearly 25 years without any paid staff.

Today WSCC supports itself through class fees, yearly memberships, donations, fund-raising events, such as last year's spring concert and the annual used book sale, and space rental. Currently, the second floor of the building is rented to the River Valley School. Classrooms are rented to community groups on an hourly basis. Major renovations to the building have required grant money, including a grant that the RSCA helped secure for paving and landscaping.

Whatever your interests, the Wilkins School Community Center offers something for just about everyone. A new event planned for late May is an Herb Festival, featuring herbal teas and food items, soap and beauty products, floral watercolor demonstrations, and a community plant swap. - The name of the wireless LAN should also be changed to something other than the default This makes it more difficult for snoopers to find your network.
- Encryption should be enabled. This requires setting a key, or password, that only authorized wireless users of your network will know – locking out others from casually using your wireless network or seeing your data.

It only takes a few minutes to protect yourself, your privacy, and your data. With people reporting on your private networks, securing your network is vital!

WIRELESS SNOOPS

Is your home network at risk?

With the abundance of older homes in Regent Square, and the desire to avoid damaging them by installing wiring for computers, many Regent Square residents are now using wireless technology for their local home computer network. As the prices of wireless units have been steadily dropping, this technology is indeed affordable. Since the range of wireless technology can be 150-300 feet – depending on circumstances; it can be very convenient for reaching every nook and cranny of a house...even extending out to the yard!

There is most certainly a security risk with all of this technology. Like any technology, wireless units are constructed using 'standards' that permit different equipment manufacturers to interoperate with one another. Since wireless technology does not respect a property line, a small unit installed in your house could easily be accessed from your neighbor's house as well as out on the sidewalk by a passer-by with a laptop.

There are groups that regularly 'survey' areas and report the wireless networks that are found in a given area. Simply looking up "Regent Square" on their web page will show a number of wireless networks broadcasting their identification information and data for any casual users to pickup along South Braddock, Biddle and other streets.

You may find this information on the web at www.pghwireless.com, including a link to an overall survey of the area. The overall survey can be 'clicked' to narrow down selections to specific streets, such as South Braddock etc..

Residents and business in Regent Square who set up wireless networks can protect themselves in several ways:

- Always change the password on any device from it's default to something that is not easy to guess. Be sure to remember the password, or write it down and lock it in a secure place.
- Most wireless devices have options that may be turned on to prevent their broadcasting an identification. This type of broadcast enables people to 'snoop' and see what devices are out there and able to be targeted. This broadcast option should be disabled.
