## A NEW LANDMARK

### *Regent Square Site Chosen For Community Mural*

This summer, Regent Square will be part of an exciting new public art project in Pittsburgh. In last month's newsletter, we reported that the RSCA's Revitalization Committee had submitted an application to the Sprout Public Art Program's Community Murals Project 2003. This month, we are happy to report that Regent Square was indeed chosen as one of eight flagship communities to kick off the first year of this project!

The Community Murals Project is intended to bring artists and communities together to create site-specific works of public art. Community engagement is essential to the Sprout Fund's vision for "enduring public art that enhances the urban landscape and considers the people of the community, their history, and their hopes for the future." Shafqet Elhi and Bashir Akhter of Braddock Avenue Express enthusiastically agreed to submit the 200 square-foot wall on the Hutchinson Street side of their building (1101 South Braddock Avenue, corner of Hutchinson) for the application, setting the tone for community involvement in the project. # SENIOR CENTER APPEAL

## *Donations of time and cell phones sought for local seniors*

The Eastern Area Adult Service's Swissvale Senior Center is responsible for packaging and delivering Home Delivered Meals to clients living in Edgewood and Regent Square. At present, they are delivering to 18 clients, two meals a day, five days a week. Dependable volunteers are needed to help in the kitchen by packaging the meals to be delivered, and delivering meals. The food is delivered to the Center each day at about 8:30 AM, and packaging the meals takes approximately 1 1/2 hours. Meals need to be delivered between 10:00 AM and 11:30 AM. Volunteers need to be able to commit to either the packaging or delivery schedule, one day per week.

The Center is also starting a campaign to collect old cell phones to give to seniors for emergency use. The Allegheny Sheriff's Department will recondition the phones, programming them to be able to call 911 only. This is a great safety program for seniors in an emergency situation. Donated cell phones need to have charging units and car chargers (if available). There is no charge to the seniors who receive them, and no charge for the 911 service. Phones can be dropped off any weekday at the Swissvale Senior Center, 7350 McClure Avenue, Swissvale, located under the Swissvale Library. ## SKILLS FOR SUCCESS

### *New Local Toastmasters Chapter Forming*

Dr. Sallie Boggs was a confident career researcher. In the lab, she was the master of her domain in the battle against cancer. But when it came to presenting her results, she wilted. While she got rave reviews from her research presentations, she had a nagging feeling that things could be better.

That's when she discovered "Toastmasters". A supportive group, full of good ideas, an opportunity to speak, and lots of regular practice with the group totally changed her presentation style.

She says that persons who heard her speak both before and after she attended the classes said that "it was like night and day". Now, as Professor Emirtus, she's still active in many areas even in retirement. So much so that she's decided to start a local chapter of Toastmasters in the Regent Square area.

Toastmasters meetings provide an environment in which everyone has the opportunity to present both prepared speeches as well as on-the-spot speeches. After presentation, feedback is provided in a positive and supportive way that encourages even the most shrinking violet to stand out and bloom.

These presentation and communication skills can be vital in both professional situations, or even community activist situations in which it's important to effectively communicate to others.

Toastmasters is so valuable and recognized that some employers will count participation as continuing education credits. It's even helped folks advance in their jobs!

If you'd like to communicate more effectively on the job, are working with a church or civic group and need to speak, or are part of the local government, Toastmasters has something to offer. And, even if you just like to speak for fun – the meetings are a great way to learn about a wide variety of topics that members present.

The club is meeting every Tuesday from 6:30 PM – 8:00 PM at the Edgewood Library. (The door is unlocked, but may stick a bit!) There is an initial fee of \$16 to join and a fee of \$24 for each 6-month interval that you participate. If your 'not sure' about this, you can always come to a meeting to see what happens. (Don't worry, guests aren't pressured to speak or make a presentation!)

## PROBLEM ON CHARLESTON

### *Is it One-Way? Yes, But...*

Charleston is a funny street! The section between South Braddock and Milton is "One Way". It's also not "One Way"! How can a street be both?

The answer is simple. To prevent the street from becoming an offload for Braddock Avenue traffic, the South Braddock end of it was restricted to be "One Way". However, that restriction ends at the alley opposite Wilkins School Community Center. The portion of Charleston between the alley and Milton is two-way.

Take care at the Charleston/Milton intersection. It's perfectly legal for traffic to come up Charleston, provided that it originated in the alley between Charleston and South Braddock. But it's not legal to enter Charleston from South Braddock!

## LOCAL PRODUCE AVAILABLE

### *Wilkesburg Farmers Market Offers Wide Choice*

Have you checked out the vegetables, fruit, baked goods, and flowers for sale at the nearby Wilkesburg Farmers Market? The market is open on Monday and Thursday afternoons from 3:00-6:30 PM, June through November. Located in the municipal parking lot behind the South Avenue Methodist Church (between Ross and South Avenues), this "growers only" market offers a convenient and alternative choice to supply some of your food needs. "Growers only" means that everything for sale at the market is produced by the vendor and not purchased elsewhere for resale.

It's a unique opportunity to do business with a farmer. It's not very often that consumers are able to see the faces behind Western Pennsylvania's local food systems. Most food passes through many hands and travels many miles before it reaches the consumer. It's a treat to bring home an ingredient for supper that was picked that very same day by a farmer who is nearby. There is also a distinctively different taste when food is this fresh!

The Wilkesburg Farmers Market was formed in 1977 and currently hosts members from Allegheny, Beaver, Butler, Indiana, Mercer, Somerset, and Washington Counties. It is a small but diverse market that is priced more reasonable than larger alternative markets. Parking is free in the adjacent lots spaces during market hours.

In May, a small group of Regent Square residents, including members of the RSCA and the Wilkins School Community Center Board, met with Sprout Fund volunteers to brainstorm possible ideas for the mural's theme. After considering the theme ideas each community generated at their brainstorming sessions, Sprout Fund facilitators assigned 4 local artists to each of the eight communities participating in the project. On Monday, 2-Jun-2003, at the RSCA monthly board meeting, the artists who were assigned to the Regent Square mural will present their preliminary designs to the community. This means you! Be sure to attend the meeting and help design the mural that will soon decorate the Regent Square Business District. Sprout Fund facilitators will again be there to help the community come to a decision, and one of the four artists will be selected to become the Regent Square muralist.

From June 10 to July 10, the chosen artist and the community, together with the help of a Sprout Fund facilitator, will work to refine the mural's concept. The project will then kick off officially with community events and celebration! The mural will be finished by the end of August, in time to join the other communities in simultaneous, city-wide mural dedication ceremonies on 31-Aug-2003.

Regent Square is among eight communities chosen for the project by the Sprout Fund's Advisory Board. Factors in the Board's decision included: site visibility, community commitment, level of organizational support, potential to maintain the site, and potential impact in the neighborhood. The seven other communities participating are: the Hill District, Millvale, Wilkinsburg, the Strip District, McKees Rocks, Garfield, and the North Side. A jury composed of thirteen individuals from Pittsburgh's Arts community selected thirty-two local artists to work on the project. Artists submitted slides of their previous work, and were scored on their technical expertise, conceptual approach, design and composition, and overall potential as a muralist.

The Sprout Fund's mission is to actively engage Pittsburgh's younger generation in shaping its future. Toward that end, the Sprout Public Art Program hopes to "improve the image that young people have of the Pittsburgh region by creating a culturally diverse and vibrant visual landscape.... The program encourages dialogue on public art between the artist

and the community, contributes to community and neighborhood development, and raises awareness about the important role that local artists can have in shaping communities." Sprout Public Art is sponsored by the American Eagle Outfitters Foundation. A rare look at selections from Pittsburgh area corporate art collections, a gala opening, and an opportunity to benefit local arts organizations will be exhibited in Regent Square's Concept Art Gallery in June. "Keeping the Arts in Business" will exhibit selections from corporate art collections in the upstairs gallery at Concept, which is located at 1031 South Braddock Avenue in the Square. The exhibit will be featured from June 26<sup>th</sup> through July 13<sup>th</sup>.

The exhibition is presented by ProArts, a Pittsburgh nonprofit corporation. ProArts provides support and training to artists and arts organizations and connects volunteers in the business world with art organizations that need their expertise. ProArts is probably best known for its ticket service, which is the telephone and internet "box office" for Quantum Theatre, The Unseam'd Shakespeare Co., the Bach Choir of Pittsburgh, and many other smaller performance groups. ProArts is also active behind the scenes through its Volunteer Lawyers for the Arts and Business Volunteers for the Arts programs, and as a grantmaker to artists and arts organizations.

Two fundraising events during the exhibition will benefit ProArts: A preview party on Thursday, June 26<sup>th</sup> from 7-10 PM will offer a chance to rub elbows with Pittsburgh art and business leaders, including honorary chair J. Kevin McMahon, President of The Pittsburgh Cultural Trust, as enjoy delicious food and refreshments.

The Gallery Talk, scheduled Thursday, July 10, at 7:00 PM will feature Thomas Sokolowski, Executive Director of the Andy Warhol Museum. Mr. Sokolowski will speak about the importance of corporate art collections and the impact of art on peoples daily lives.
