Mural Dedication Party

September 18th -mark your calendars!

After a long, hot summer of hard work by artist Kristin Williams (and more than a few neighborhood volunteers), the mural on the Hutchinson Street side of the Braddock Avenue Express will be officially dedicated to the residents of Regent Square on Thursday, September 18th. The dedication party, which begins at 7PM and is expected to last for an hour or so, will round out a week of similar celebrations across the area, as the Sprout Public Art Community Murals Project wraps up its first year of work.

A plaque will be installed on the mural site, commemorating the project, the community, and the artist. Local officials will be invited to speak, and then an informal neighborhood party will get underway, with popcorn, snow cones, and plenty of merriment! The guests of honor will be artist Kristin Williams and Bashir Akhter, owner of the Brad-

dock Avenue Express. This will be your chance to say, "thank you," to them, for creating such a beautiful and compelling neighborhood landmark!

Residents seem to have enjoyed watching the mural evolve over the summer, and Kristin was delighted to see so much interest in the project while she was working. Now that the mural is nearly complete, a few of the common questions about the design can be answered:

"What does it mean?" The composition is an aerial (or bird's-eye) view of Regent Square and Frick Park, with birds flying over the houses and into the park. The birds can be seen as a metaphor for the varied people and personalities that make up the Regent Square community.

The 1.5 Fun Run/Walk, started by Swissvale Mayor Mark Foerster, sent 313 runners, walkers, strollers, and 70 dogs, all donned with their Run Around The Square t-shirts and dog scarves, through Regent Square.

Map Pittsburgh Project

City Neighborhoods Will Be Rezoned to Reflect Actual Land Use

Wanda Wilson of the Department of City Planning gave a short presentation at the August RSCA Board meeting (4-AUG-2003) about the city's Map Pittsburgh Project. Map Pittsburgh comes out of Pittsburgh's new zoning ordinance, passed in 1999. The new zoning code was tailored to fit the unique urban characteristics of Pittsburgh's neighborhoods, and a subsequent conversion map was approved to convert old zoning districts into comparable districts in the new code. However, a basic problem with the old code still remains to be corrected: zoning districts in some areas do not match actual land use.

The goal of Map Pittsburgh is to make sure each neighborhood has the most appropriate zoning. Map Pittsburgh works together with neighborhood organizations, property owners, and residents to develop a new zoning map that reflects existing land uses and trends in development. Each neighborhood is analyzed individually by documenting land use patterns and discussing proposed changes with each community. The benefits of rezoning include: reflecting neighborhood planning goals, creating development standards that fit a neighborhood's character, stopping and eventually reversing negative impacts on a neighborhood due to inappropriate zoning, and putting the most appropriate blueprint in place for the neighborhood's future development.

Map Pittsburgh is already gathering land use information on the City portion of Regent Square (only land inside the city limits of Pittsburgh is subject to rezoning), and entering this data into a computer database to prepare a base land use map with preliminary zoning recommendations. All residents within the City neighborhood of Regent Square will receive official notification via mail of a special community meeting with Map Pittsburgh in October to review these preliminary recommendations and work on the zoning proposal. The RSCA urges those residents to take part in the meeting and participate in the rezoning process. “Where’s my house?” While there was not room in the design to depict every street in the neighborhood, all four municipalities that make up Regent Square (Edgewood, Pittsburgh, Swissvale, and Wilkinsburg) are represented. The borders of the map are approximately East End Avenue, Sanders, Trevanion, and Overton. All of the rooftops depicted are based on aerial photographs and detailed notes of the actual buildings on those streets, so if you live within that area of Regent Square, your house is on the map. Of course, it might fall underneath one of the beautiful birds flying over.

“What kinds of birds are they? Are they real?” All of the birds are real species that can be found at least part of the year in Regent Square. Kristin is an ornithological artist, meaning she creates extremely detailed scientific illustrations of birds for identification purposes. Her work can be seen in the portrait identification labels at the National Aviary here in Pittsburgh, as well as in published portrait anthologies. The three largest birds in the composition are a Scarlet Tanager, an Indigo Bunting, and a Goldfinch.

“Who is sponsoring this project?” The mural is part of the Sprout Public Art Program’s Community Murals Project 2003.

The Community Murals Project is intended to bring artists and communities together to create site-specific works of public art. Community engagement is essential to the Sprout Fund’s vision for “enduring public art that enhances the urban landscape and considers the people of the community, their history, and their hopes for the future.” Eight communities were chosen for the program this year. The seven other communities are: the Hill District, Millvale, Wilkinsburg, the Strip District, McKees Rocks, Garfield, and the North Side. The Sprout Fund’s mission is to actively engage Pittsburgh’s younger generation in shaping its future. Toward that end, the Sprout Public Art Program hopes to “improve the image that young people have of the Pittsburgh region by creating a culturally diverse and vibrant visual landscape.... The program ages dialogue on public art between the artist and the community, contributes to community and neighborhood development, and raises awareness about the important role that local artists can have in shaping communities.” Sprout Public Art is sponsored by the American Eagle Outfitters Foundation. That’s when the angels appeared! They were out walking their dogs. The first “angel,” who noticed the Pletchers in distress, summoned the other dog walker, who had a cell phone. A quick call to 911 was made and help was on the way.

While they were waiting for the ambulance, one of the good Samaritans went home and reappeared with a bag of ice for Jean’s rapidly swelling leg, as well as some carpet for her to sit on.

As time passed, they dialed 911 again because the ambulance seemed to be taking

too long. The ambulance was lost, and the additional phone call helped to clarify directions to the accident scene.

In the meantime, yet another kind person stopped her car to help, and covered Jean with a quilt. This kind person also drove Jean’s husband home for his heart medicine, and then over to the hospital Emergency Room in Oakland.

Jean sends a very special thanks to all of her “angels,” as well as the EMT’s, surgeons, nurses and physical therapists. She’s happy to report that she’s now up, walking again, and even braving the trails of Frick Park.

And, if any of these mysterious people see the Pletchers in the Park again, please stop and say “hello”. Jean says, “I’d like to say ‘thank you’ again. You truly were my angels that morning!” ■
